From what I am able to discern the main raffle prize will be a Canon Pixma <u>Pro 10</u> which is the printer you have been wishing for. In a quick overview, it is a ten color printer with three black inks for stunning images without metamerism or the variable glossy ink color that other printers create. This printer is wireless and creates colors that print what you saw when you shot that image. Retail price: \$700, and one of you gets to walk out with it from the meeting. There will also be some G-Tech hard drives! We have built up enough raffle prizes that virtually everyone will get a some prize. This was recently proven when Colin was asked by Russell to work with him to teach a class on flying drone copters during a special class at PhotoshopWorld in Las Vegas. When Photoshop people and drone people found out, the class sold out in minutes.

On another note, we have noticed a large number of "members" of the ATX not showing up at some of our "better" or larger meetings, particularly the last few. Ron Husband taught a fabulous master class on sketching to a very small audience. Bryan O'Neill Hughes the lead imaging manager at Adobe, covered Photoshop and Lightroom quite extensively. A number of you may not be aware that these meetings now cost us 65% more than before due to room rentals and more, and we have maintained the attendance fee for 22 years. We would like to think that we have been getting informative speakers talking about topics that everyone should be interested in. As always we are want to know which subjects you want covered in future meetings. Eventually Lynette Kent joined the group and actually she spends a lot of time getting speakers, companies, and raffle prizes for attendees. Even Scott Kelby has cut back on Photoshop World as it now appears that there will be only one a year in Las Vegas.
